The Threepenny Opera at the National Theatre



Mack the Knife is coming to town on **18 May**. Or, more precisely, he's coming to London's <u>National Theatre</u>. <u>Bookings</u> are open for this major new production in translation by Simon Stephens, starring Rory Kinnear. The play will be running throughout the

period of the 'Recycling Brecht' Symposium, so if you're flying to the UK to attend the conference, you'll be able to catch this show in London too.

If you are in London earlier in June, you can also see Tom Kuhn in conversation with the National Theatre's Head of Music, Matthew Scott. On **8 June**, they will be discussing Brecht and Weill's collaboration in a pre-performance talk. Tickets are available on the <u>National Theatre website</u>.
